Image #1: M.L.S.

Medium Long Shot

- → Knees to top of head
- → Shows body language, posture
- → Physical movement is visible




Image #2: M.L.S.

Medium Long Shot

- → Knees to top of head
- → Shows body language, posture
- → Physical movement is visible



Image #3: L.S.

Long Shot

- → From feet to top of head
- → Shows even more physical movement than M.L.S.
- → Popular for sports, dance, to show reaction at an event
- → Most useful for action




Image #4: M.C.U.

Medium Close-Up

- → Middle of chest to top of head
- → Good shot when you want viewer to think the person is talking directly to them and/or to draw attention to the idea that the person has something to say



Image #5: E.L.S.

(*Created through the combination of two different images)

Extreme Long Shot

- → Person is small in image and you see tons of background scenery
- → Makes landscape more important than the person
- → "Establishing shot" because it establishes the day/night/season/tells you about the setting

*NOTE: In this case, I knew that I would be combining these two images to create my E.L.S., and therefore, an « establishing shot »





Image #6: C.U.

Close-Up

- → Shoulders to top of head
- → Often a reaction shot
 - → Shows how the person is feeling



Image #7: M.C.U.

Medium Close-Up

- → Middle of chest to top of head
- → Good shot when you want viewer to think the person is talking directly to them and/or to draw attention to the idea that the person has something to say



Image #8: H.C.A.

High Camera Angle

→ Camera is up high looking down, making the person/people look vulnerable
